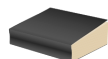


Learning Pathway: Racial Justice and Black Lives Matter

The Racial Justice and Black Lives Matter Learning Pathway features four digital choice boards: Black Lives Historical Explorations; Black History Month; History of the Black Press; and Exploring Black History with ChatGPT. Building Democracy For All is designed so that teachers and students can follow different learning pathways as they explore the material in the book. 

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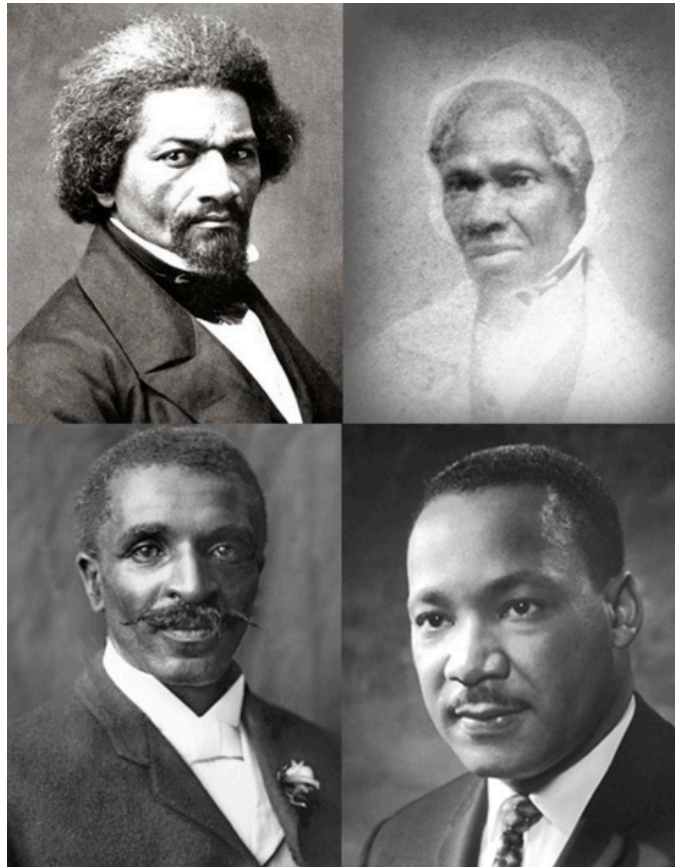

Critical Media Literacy Connection: Explore Black History with ChatGPT

The "[Exploring Black History with ChatGPT](#)" choice board offers educators and students a way to develop their critical media literacy skills as they investigate text from ChatGPT and explore Black history in the United States ([click here to make your own copy of the choice board to remix/use](#)). Given ChatGPT's potential for generating misinformation and biased information, these activities offer students a critical way to investigate how ChatGPT writes about Black lives and history, and potentially consider why this may be.

<p>Langston Hughes</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to write a poem about a social issue (e.g., homelessness, climate change, gender inequality) in the style of Langston Hughes. Critically analyze the language, word choices, and style compared to Langston Hughes' poems.</p> 	<p>Yvonne Y. Clark (Y.Y.)</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to write a motivational graduation speech given by Yvonne Y. Clark. Critically examine the writing style, language, and word choices compared to other graduation speeches. Revise the speech to present a more authentic and accurate version of what Y.Y. might say.</p> 	<p>Aisha Bowe</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to write a nonfiction story about Aisha Bowe's first flight in space. Fact check and analyze the credibility, trustworthiness, and authenticity of the story. Present your findings as a news report article or video.</p> 	
<p>Elizabeth Freeman (Mum Bett)</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to present a court docket for the Brom and Bett v. Ashley case. Fact check and critically analyze the credibility, trustworthiness, and authenticity of the court docket. Create a podcast about events leading from that case to Juneteenth.</p> 	<p>Exploring Black History with ChatGPT: A Critical Media Literacy Digital Choice Board</p> <p><small>*NOTE: If you work with students under 18 years old, please do not ask them to use ChatGPT on their own devices (see the privacy policy and terms of use restrictions). Instead, use your own device to insert prompts.</small></p> <p><small>Learn more from resourcesforhistoryteachers: Building Democracy for All: & Critical Media Literacy & Civic Learning</small></p>		<p>Frederick Douglass</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to write a news article to fight for equality in the style of Frederick Douglass. Use Teacher & Student Guide to Analyzing News & Newspapers to critically analyze ChatGPT's text compared to Douglass' work.</p> 
<p>Black Innovators in STEM</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to generate a list of 10 lesser-known Black individuals in science, math, technology and engineering. Select one for whom to research and then design an augmented reality statue or digital 3D model.</p> 	<p>A Philip Randolph</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to write a movie script about A. Philip Randolph and Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters. Critically evaluate the credibility, trustworthiness, and authenticity of the script then remix it into your own version of a script.</p> 	<p>Political Courage</p> <p>Ask ChatGPT to write a children's book about individuals who refused to give up their seats on buses, trains, and streetcars. Fact check and revise ChatGPT's text to design your own book.</p>
